Isaac Newton was born in 1643 in Wools Thorpe, England. He was the son of a peasant who died three months before Isaac was born. Newton spent most of his early years with his maternal grandmother after his mother remarried. His education was interrupted by a failed attempt to turn him into a farmer. In the beginning, he seemed to be a dull boy. He had little interest in his studies. However, he liked to use his hands. He used to make little machines, such as windmills. He would catch mice and make them drive some of his little machines.

At the age of nineteen, Newton went to Cambridge University where he studied mathematics and science. He started to make discoveries in mathematics when he was a college student. He continued to do so after he had achieved his degree. He was appointed Professor of mathematics when he was only 26 years old.

Newton did not limit his studies to mathematics. He became very interested in the behavior of light. His interest in light led to the improvement of telescopes. The lenses used in telescopes in those days were not as good as modern-day lenses. Newton showed that curved mirrors could be used instead of lenses. These gave better results in some ways and such telescopes have been used ever since.

Laxmi Prasad Devkota was born on the night of Laxmi Puja Day in 1909 to Tilmadhav Devkota and Amar Rajya Laxmi Devi in Dillibazar, Kathmandu. He was born at a time when the Hindus including, his family, were worshiping Laxmi, the goddess of wealth. So, his parents took his birth as the greatest gift of the Goddess and accordingly, named him Laxmi Prasad—the blessings of Goddess Laxmi.

Devkota's father was a scholar in the Sanskrit language. Laxmi Prasad Devkota got his basic education at home under the guidance of his father. He completed Bachelor's Degree in liberal arts and law. Right after earning his bachelor's degree, Devkota started working as a personal tutor—a rigorous job, that lasted for hours every day. He had to do that to support his family.

During Devkota's time, the country was under Rana's dictatorial rule. Young Devkota knew the importance of education and he promised to do something to help educate the mass. But the idea was not well received by the then Rana rulers. They believed in the idea that the general people should continue to remain illiterate so that they would not go against them.
